Selectmen's Meeting Minutes 9:00 am – Tuftonboro Town House

Monday June 7, 2021

Present: Chairman Bill Marcussen, Selectman Chip Albee, Selectman Guy Pike and Administrative Secretary Cathy Pounder.

CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Marcussen called the Selectmen's meeting to order at approximately 9:00 am and lead the pledge of allegiance.

PUBLIC INPUT

Chairman Marcussen stated the agenda is full today and the seaplane issue is not on the agenda, the Board will not be spending much time on that subject. Dennis Gauvin, Judith Crouse, and Robert Roriston brought their concerns with the seaplane landing at the Town's 19 Mile Bay pier. Mr. Gauvin asked if there would be a dedicated spot for the plane. Chairman Marcussen informed the public the only request brought before the Selectmen is the Town lowering the wooden posts so Mr. Wood could have clearance for his plane's wing. There has not been any conversation to dedicate a spot for the seaplane or any other vessel. He mentioned that the dock has boats waiting to dock regularly and a dedicated spot would slow up boat traffic. Ms. Crouse asked if the public would be notified when a discussion or an action is taken. The Chairman assured her that when they see a demo or have discussion on the subject the public would be notified. This will be done by agenda and/or public notice, the Selectmen do not see they are close to discussing it at this time. Mr. Roriston asked if the safety concerns, signage, propellers, and danger of wings listed on the Certificate Mr. Wood received from the Statewill be considered. The Board has not been presented with any request for commercial activities at this time and if they do get a request, it will be considered at that time. Thomas Wood addressed the audience referencing the concern of threats of the airplane being blocked. He asked the public to remember there are people in the planes. He stated to interfere with an airplane's flight is against the law. He stated he only asked to have the pier adjusted to assist seaplanes in general. He stated he has felt very threaten and there are statues that protects them. He asked that the public contact him with any questions or concerns they may have.

MINUTES

Selectman Albee made a motion to approve the 5.21.2021 BOS meeting minutes as presented. Selectman Pike seconded. Motion carried 3-0.

Selectman Albee made a motion to approve the 5.21.2021 BOS non-public meeting minutes as presented. Selectman Pike seconded. Motion carried 3-0. Chairman Marcussen stated they should remain sealed.

Selectman Albee made a motion to approve the 6.4.2021 BOS WS meeting minutes as presented. Selectman Pike seconded. Motion carried 3-0.

APPOINTMENTS

Jack Parsons, Code Officer, reported he has processed 71 building permits, 15 new houses, and has performed 216 inspections. He has installed the drop box in the front of the Town Office and the walk, in front of the Town Office, has been repaired. The cupula has been completed. The sprinkler system will get done in July. The air conditioner will be installed at the Town House today.

Chris Ruel, Transfer Station Supervisor, reviewed the attached information with the Selectmen. The attached is April numbers as the May numbers have not been finished due to not receiveing Waste Management numbers. They have gone from 3 construction containers to 15. The Selectmen and Mr. Ruel discussed C&D numbers. The Selectmen would like Mr. Ruel to analyze if the fees at the Transfer Station need to be adjusted to today rates. The fees should meet at least 90% of what the tipping fees cost the Town. The Selectmen would like the C&D in a separate column to see the cost compared to the revenue. The group discussed the cost of containers for paper recycling in 2022. The cardboard bales are at 30,081 pounds since March.

The Selectmen met with Donald Willet and Harry Benson to discuss having solar arrays installed at the Transfer Station on the capped landfill. The gentleman discussed the procedure and the timeline. This is a meeting to see if it is even possible to do the project and if the Town might be interested. The group discussed the Town owning the arrays versus the company owning the arrays and the Town leasing the property to them at a price of \$1,500 per acre per year for 35 years. 1 megawatt takes 5 acres of land. The Town will also get a discount on their electric as well as the residents of Tuftonboro if they sign up. The gentleman will do an analysis of the land and report to the Town if it is possible and present a proposal. This project would take a few years to activate. Selectman Pike asked if there was a leak at the landfill how would the company deal with the required repaired activities. They stated that would be included in the lease.

Tyler Phillips updated the Selectmen on the Union Wharf repairs. He has received positive feedback from Rainy Pelletier, DES. The cost to separate the project and the impact on the public, was presented to Mr. Pelletier and itdid convince him to move forward with a recommendation. The Town needs to get the legal right to occupy the portion of the lakebed to perform the repairs. DES wants to see a set of plans of where the sheet pilings will go along the timbers. The extension will extend out with sheet pilings about 14 to 15 inches. Once they see a plan showing what we are proposing then DES could support the project. Once DES supports the repair then the Town will meet with Councilor Kenny, on site, to show him the project.

Selectman Albee made a motion to sign the MS 232. Selectman Pike seconded. Motion carried 3-0.

Selectman Albee made a motion to have the Chairman sign a Pottie Patrol - Portable Restroom Rental Contract – Melvin Wharf & Pier19. Selectman Pike seconded. Motion carried 3-0.

Selectman Albee made a motion to have the Chairman sign a Pottie Patrol - Portable Restroom Rental Contract – Transfer Station once the purpose is verified. Selectman Pike seconded. Motion carried 3-0.

Selectman Albee made a motion to sign the JLMC 2021 Annual Inspection Reports. Selectman Pike seconded. Motion carried 3-0.

Selectman Albee made a motion to sign the employee compensation change forms for the Town's employees. Selectman Pike seconded. Motion carried 3-0. These are usually done in March but with Town Meeting being delayed, the employee raises had to be delayed.

ACTION ITEMS

The Selectmen wanted the North Country Village – Community Water System – Well Monitor Request seen by the Fire Chief to verify.

The Selectmen would like to verify if Lloyd Wood would like to continue as the Lakes Region Planning Commission TAC Representative.

Chairman Marcussen will tweak the Communications District Planning Committee Volunteer Rep. Advertisement before it goes to the newspaper.

SELECTMEN'S UPDATE

Selectman Albee received a letter he requested from the Fire Chief to assist with the Governor's Council meeting for the Union Wharf project. Selectman Albee received an answer from the NHMA on the Tax Anticipation Note and it requires a Town vote. Selectman Albee calculated the betterment tax for Willand Road and will present it to the other Board members at their next meeting.

Selectman Pike received an email informing the Selectmen that Lake Road was not mowed, and Melvin Wharf beach and docks are in poor condition. The gentleman volunteered to do the mowing. Selectman Pike did go to see their condition and agrees with the resident. Selectman Pike will speak with the Road Agent to have it taken care of.

Chairman Marcussen stated the Governor emergency order expires Friday, which means remote meetings expire. Boards and Commissions needs to return to live meetings. Chairman Marcussen made a motion to discontinue the mask requirement at the Town Offices. Selectman Pike seconded the motion. Motion carried 3-0. All Town employees at the Town Offices have been vaccinated. Planning Board last Thursday approved the site plan for the Tuftonboro Neck Rd. cell tower with 13 conditions. The existing cell tower on County Road in Melvin, when it was approved, did not require they come back as equipment was adjusted or added. The requirement is if you build a tower in Tuftonboro you must have availability for 3 additional companies to put antennas. One condition on this new tower is with additions of any additional antennas or changes to equipment, they must come back for a site plan update. Two specific items that was discussed heavily was RF energy once built and noise level. There will be documented tests on noise and RF Energy once the tower is built. The Planning Board accepted the applications for the two cell towers on Town property. Dan Duffy asked if it was going to be camouflage as a tree and it will be. The State was out to do their Spring milfoil survey and identified two areas for treatment, the Basin and Melvin Village Marina.

PUBLIC INPUT

Dennis Gauvin, the Treasurer of Pier 19 condominiums, stated he received notice that near the 19 Mile Bay Area and where the river comes in are scheduled to be treated this Fall. Chairman Marcussen informed him that is for phragmites and not milfoil. Different treatments and weeds. Robert Roriston stated there is a lot of misinformation out there on the seaplane issue and appreciates the process being explained and publicized by the Selectmen. Dan Duffy said there was an airport near Black Island. The Selectmen stressed again, no one requested a commercial operation on Town owned property. That request would be handled separately. The Selectmen were told it was for private, non-commercial flight. The Selectmen believe that this kind of issue should be brought to Town Meeting for a vote. A member of the public asked about the outrigger boats on the beach, they are in the way of concert attendees. Selectman Pike will be addressing that issue with the Parks and Rec committee at their next meeting.

NON-PUBLIC

At approximately 11:35 am, Chairman Marcussen made a motion to enter a non-public session per RSA 91-A: 3 II (c) Reputation. Selectman Albee seconded the motion. Roll call vote: Marcussen – Yes; Albee – Yes; Pike - Yes.

At approximately 11:49 am, Selectman Pike made a motion to exit the non-public session and reconvene public session. Selectman Albee seconded the motion. Motion carried 3-0.

Selectman Pike made a motion to seal the 6/7/2021 non-public minutes. Selectman Albee seconded the motion. Motion carried 3-0.

ADJOURNMENT

At approximately 11:50 am, Selectman Albee made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Selectman Pike. Motion carried 3-0.
