Items *Unacceptable* for Recycling

- Carbon Paper
- Waxed Paper
- Waxed Cardboard
- Blueprints
- Milk Cartons
- Tyvek Envelopes
- Food Contaminated Products
- Plastic Bags (all kinds)
- Styrofoam

The State of New Hampshire has no facility to recycle clean plastic grocery bags; therefore, the Transfer Station does not accept them. *We do, however, strongly urge residents to recycle them. Local supermarkets do offer this service, so please use this method -- recycle and use recycled bags.*

Soup, Juice, and Dog/Cat Food Cans

FLUORESCENT BULBS must be disposed
of properly and require special care;
therefore, a fee is imposed.

Attention DIY (Do-It-Yourself) Oil Changers

BRING USED MOTOR OIL TO THE
STATION . . .

1. In Clean, Clear, One-gallon (or smaller)
Containers with a Secure Lid.
2. Clearly Marked "USED OIL."
3. No Anti-Freeze, Gasoline, Hydraulic Fluid
or Other Chemicals.

BATTERIES

All batteries can be recycled -- even
lithium batteries.

USAGE FEES

The station charges fees for those items (and
those items ONLY) that incur specific costs to
the station or are particularly labor-intensive.

Complete usage fees can be found on line
and are posted at the Transfer Station, and
those updated fees supersede other listings,
including those listed here.

Please don't hesitate to ask for help!

Typical fees include:

Mattresses - \$5 - \$10

Furniture, Rugs, other Bulky Items - \$5 and up

Electronic Devices - \$5

TVs, Monitors - \$10 - \$20 depending on size

Construction Debris, 6' Pickup - \$40

Construction Debris, 8' Pickup - \$50

Appliances with Freon - \$10

Appliances without Freon - \$5

SOLID WASTE PROCESSING (2015 Data)

Recycle Rate: 70 - 75%

Annual recyclable *income*: \$70,000

Annual avoided costs: \$20,470

Annual total benefit from recycling: ~\$97,470

The balance between costs and income is determined by the volume of solid waste to be hauled and the quantity of materials recycled. In other words, all of your recycled items — every bottle, cardboard carton, and beer can — is a saving of money.

RECYCLE MORE!

The “FOUR R’s” of SOLID WASTE

REDUCE:

Buy only what you need and look for products with minimal packaging.

REPAIR:

Fix (or have fixed) broken items whenever possible.

REUSE:

Re-purpose items or find someone who can use what you have through donations, swap shops, garage sales or resale shops.

Be creative!

RECYCLE:

Properly dispose of items at the Transfer Station; use the swap shop; create new items out of unwanted ones.

Buy Recycled Products!

What else can *I* do to reduce my impact on my environment?

Take responsible action to protect your family’s health and the health of our community.

READ THE LABEL. Avoid products that contain hazardous ingredients; try safer or less toxic alternatives; use non-toxic cleaners that contain just a few basic ingredients.

ALL PURPOSE CLEANER: Mix two tablespoons baking soda with one pint of warm water in a spray bottle. Add a squeeze of lemon juice or some vinegar to cut grease.

OVEN CLEANER: Mix one part vinegar to four parts water in a spray bottle. Scrub the oven clean. Use baking soda or a citrus-based cleaner on stubborn spots.

NO-STREAK GLASS/WINDOW CLEANER: Mix one half cup of white vinegar and one quart warm water; apply with spray bottle or sponge. Wipe with crumpled newspaper.

QUANTITY: Buy only as much as you will use; give extra product(s) away.

BUY RECYCLED: Recycled products perform as well as virgin products. Ask retailers to try to stock recycled products.

BE SAFE: Store products in containers with lids intact and properly labeled — and always away from children and pets.

Hazardous waste collection is held at the Wolfeboro facility in May-Oct on the third Saturday of the month, 8:30 - noon. Watch for announcement.

Brush and wood collection and disposal is accomplished here on site.
